We thank you for the immense collection of judgments handed down by the Council, establishing the foundation for the development of the jurisprudence of Belize and which continue to guide its legal practitioners in their study of the law. These judgments, masterfully displaying the language, learning and techniques of legal reasoning developed by Her Majesty's Privy Council since as far back as 1833, have greatly helped to equip our leaders and our people with the skills and knowledge required to build an independent nation rooted in the principles of law, order and good governance. Your integrity and total independence from political influences, have established the benchmark against which our judges and other judges of the Caribbean region have been and will continue to be judged.

Your services are no less valuable today than they were when Belize first achieved its independence in 1981.
